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PROBLEM IN CLASS – WEEK 2

These additional problems are for your own preparation at home. They supplement examples and properties not discussed in class. Some of them will be discussed interactively in the weekly exercise/tutorial sessions. You are not required to hand in their solution. You are encouraged to think them over and to solve them. Problem 5. Let X be a Banach space. Show that any operator $S : X \rightarrow X$ of the form $S = \mathbb{1} - T$, where T is compact, has closed range.

(*Hint:* show that you can factor out $\text{Ker } S$ and prove $\|Sx\| \geq c\|x\|$ ($c > 0$) on the complement.)

Problem 6. Notation: given $q, r \in (1, \infty)$ and d positive integer, by $L_t^q(\mathbb{R}, L^r(\mathbb{R}_x^d))$ we denote the Banach space of functions $f(t, x)$, $(t, x) \in \mathbb{R} \times \mathbb{R}^d$, such that $f(t, \cdot) \in L^r(\mathbb{R}^d)$ for almost all $t \in \mathbb{R}$ and $t \mapsto \|f(t, \cdot)\|_{L^r(\mathbb{R}^d)}$ is in $L^q(\mathbb{R})$ – this is a customary notation in PDE theory. By q' we denote the Hölder dual index of q , that is, $\frac{1}{q} + \frac{1}{q'} = 1$.

Let $t \mapsto U(t)$, $t \in \mathbb{R}$, be a one-parameter group of unitary operators on $L^2(\mathbb{R}^d)$, that is, each $U(t) : L^2(\mathbb{R}^d) \rightarrow L^2(\mathbb{R}^d)$ is unitary and $U(0) = \mathbb{1}$, $U(t+s) = U(t)U(s) \forall t, s$. Assume that U satisfies the following property:

$$\|U(\cdot)f\|_{L_t^q(\mathbb{R}, L^r(\mathbb{R}_x^d))} \leq C \|f\|_{L^2(\mathbb{R}^d)} \quad \forall f \in L^2(\mathbb{R}^d) \quad (*)$$

for some constant $C > 0$. (An important application is when U is the free Schrödinger propagator, $U(t) = e^{it\Delta}$. In this case $(*)$ goes under the name of *Strichartz inequality*, a fundamental tool for the proof of uniqueness of solutions to PDE.) Deduce from $(*)$ the “dual” inequality

$$\left\| \int_{-\infty}^{+\infty} U(-t)F(t, \cdot) dt \right\|_{L^2(\mathbb{R}^d)} \leq C \|F\|_{L_t^{q'}(\mathbb{R}, L^{r'}(\mathbb{R}_x^d))} \quad \forall F \in L_t^{q'}(\mathbb{R}, L^{r'}(\mathbb{R}_x^d)), \quad (**)$$

that is, the function $x \mapsto (\int_{-\infty}^{+\infty} U(-t)F(t, \cdot) ds)(x)$ is in $L^2(\mathbb{R}^d)$ and its L^2 -norm satisfies the bound $(**)$.

(*Hint:* just a straightforward application of the definition of the Hilbert adjoint of $U(t)$ and of the Banach adjoint of $T : L^2(\mathbb{R}^d) \rightarrow L_t^q(\mathbb{R}, L^r(\mathbb{R}_x^d))$, $f \mapsto U(\cdot)f$.)

Problem 7. (Useful identities and inequalities involving resolvents.) Let X be a Banach space. As usual, given $T \in \mathcal{B}(X)$, $\rho(T)$ is the resolvent set for T and $R_\lambda(T)$, $\lambda \in \rho(T)$, is the resolvent of T at λ , that is, $R_\lambda(T) = (\lambda\mathbb{1} - T)^{-1}$. Prove the following:

- (i) $R_\lambda(T) - R_\mu(T) = (\mu - \lambda)R_\lambda(T)R_\mu(T) \quad \forall \lambda, \mu \in \rho(T)$
- (ii) $R_\lambda(T) - R_\lambda(S) = R_\lambda(T)(T - S)R_\lambda(S) \quad \forall \lambda \in \rho(T) \cap \rho(S)$
- (iii) $R_\lambda(T) = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} (\lambda - \lambda_0)^n R_{\lambda_0}(T)^{n+1}$ for $|\lambda - \lambda_0| < \|R_{\lambda_0}(T)\|^{-1}$ and $\lambda, \lambda_0 \in \rho(T)$
- (iv) $R_\lambda(T) = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \lambda^{-1-n} T^n$ for $|\lambda| > \|T\|$
- (v) $\|R_\lambda(T)\| \geq (\text{dist}(\lambda, \sigma(T)))^{-1} \quad \forall \lambda \in \rho(T)$
- (vi) If X is a Hilbert space and $T = T^*$ then $\|R_\lambda(T)\| \leq |\Im(\lambda)|^{-1} \quad \forall \lambda \in \mathbb{C} \setminus \mathbb{R}$

Problem 8. Consider the operator $T : \ell^1(\mathbb{N}) \rightarrow \ell^1(\mathbb{N})$, $T(x_1, x_2, x_3, \dots) = (x_2, x_3, \dots)$.

- (i) Show that T is bounded with $\|T\| = 1$.
- (ii) Determine T' (domain and action).
- (iii) Show that $\sigma(T) = \{\lambda \in \mathbb{C}, |\lambda| \leq 1\}$.
- (iv) Show that $\sigma_p(T) = \{\lambda \in \mathbb{C}, |\lambda| < 1\}$.
- (v) Show that $\sigma_p(T') = \emptyset$.
- (vi) Show that $\sigma_r(T) = \emptyset$.
- (vii) Show that $\sigma(T') = \{\lambda \in \mathbb{C}, |\lambda| \leq 1\}$.
- (viii) Show that $\sigma_r(T') = \{\lambda \in \mathbb{C}, |\lambda| \leq 1\}$.
