Exercise 9. Let S be any set and let (X, d_X) be a metric space. Define

$$\mathcal{B}(S, X) := \{f : S \rightarrow X \mid f \text{ is bounded}\}.$$

(Recall that $f : S \rightarrow X$ is bounded means that $\sup_{s, s' \in S} d_X(f(s_1), f(s_2)) < \infty$.) For every $f, g \in \mathcal{B}(S, X)$ define

$$d_\infty(f, g) := \sup_{s \in S} d_X(f(s), g(s)).$$

- (i) Show that d_∞ is a metric on $\mathcal{B}(S, X)$.
- (ii) Assume that (X, d_X) is *complete*. Show that then $(\mathcal{B}(S, X), d_\infty)$ is also complete.

Exercise 10. Let $a = \{a_n\}_{n=1}^\infty$ be a sequence in \mathbb{R}^+ . Let

$$S^{(a)} := \left\{ x = (x_1, x_2, x_3, \dots) \text{ such that } \sum_{n=1}^\infty |x_n|^2 < \infty \text{ and } |x_n| < a_n \forall n \right\} \subset \ell^2.$$

Prove that $S^{(a)}$ is open in ℓ^2 if and only if $\inf_n a_n > 0$.

Exercise 11. Let (X, μ) be a measure space and let $\{f_n\}_{n=1}^\infty$ be a sequence of integrable functions on (X, μ) . Suppose that there exists an integrable function f such that

- (a) $f_n \rightarrow f$ pointwise almost everywhere,
- (b) $\int_X |f_n| d\mu \rightarrow \int_X |f| d\mu$ as $n \rightarrow \infty$.

Prove that $\int_X |f - f_n| d\mu \rightarrow 0$ as $n \rightarrow \infty$.

Exercise 12. Recall that the distance $d(x, W)$ of a point x in the normed space $(X, \|\cdot\|_X)$ from a subspace $W \subset X$ is defined as $d(x, W) := \inf_{w \in W} \|x - w\|_X$ (see also the discussion in Exercise 3, part (ii)).

- (i) Consider the normed space ℓ^∞ with the natural supremum norm. Let $a = (a_1, a_2, a_3, \dots) \in \ell^\infty$ with $a_n = \sum_{k=1}^n \frac{1}{k^2}$. Compute the distance of a from the subspace

$$c_0 := \{x = (x_1, x_2, x_3, \dots) \mid x_n \in \mathbb{C} \text{ and } \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} x_n = 0\}.$$

- (ii) Consider the normed space $C([-1, 1])$ equipped with the supremum norm. Compute the distance of the function $f \in C([-1, 1])$, $f(x) = |x|$, from the subspace $C^1([-1, 1])$.

- (iii) Compute the distance, in the L^1 -norm, of the function $f \in L^1(\mathcal{B}_2)$, $f(x) = |x|^{-1}$, where

$$\mathcal{B}_R = \{x \in \mathbb{R}^3 \mid |x| \leq R\} \quad (\text{the ball of radius } R),$$

from the subspace $\{g \mid g \in L^1(\mathcal{B}_2) \text{ and } g \equiv 0 \text{ as } x \in \mathcal{B}_1\}$.
